### **Meet Bruce Mote:**

Bruce was born at Burwood Hospital in 1953 and was part of a large family comprising of eight brothers & sisters. He recalls his younger life as being very tough with a father who was an alcoholic and from an early age he quickly learnt to be self-sufficient. By the age of 11, Bruce was mowing lawns and delivering groceries to earn extra money and he said he loved these jobs. He felt that he was making a better life for himself and this attitude guided where and what he did in his future life.

He has lived the majority of his life in and around Belfast where he is widely known in the community. Prior to moving to Belfast, Bruce attended Bishopdale Primary then Papanui High School before leaving school at 15 to go to sea. A huge challenge for a young "boy". He started off as a deck boy on the Aramoana doing stints on the Aranui & Maori then after 2-3 years, progressing to international work for about 10 years with BP Oil. He completed all his tickets and became an engineer specialising in steam and had jobs with Shaw Saville and P&O along the way. At this point, he came ashore and worked for BP Oil at Lyttelton for approx. 18 months and it was at this point that he and his wife, Dorothy, purchased their Belfast home. A variety of jobs ensued, working for Zealandia in the soap/candle factory,

CFM Meat Co as a maintenance man then onto Scott's Engineering doing the same. Scott's offered Bruce an opportunity to become involved in the installation of boilers & LPG tanks. This eventually provided Bruce the opportunity to become self-employed for the next 4 years cleaning/repairing fuel/chemical tanks all over the south island.

It was in Timaru in 1985 when Bruce was instructing the Fire Service how "not" to get burnt while cleaning tanks that his accident happened. Whilst kneeling in acid in the bottom of a tank, a pair of faulty overalls allowed acid to come into




contact with his legs and his problems began. He spent 18 months in Burwood Hospital and after numerous skin grafts to save his leg, a decision was made to amputate his right leg. After being fitted with a prosthesis, Bruce successfully carried out maintenance work for local schools for around 2 years before an accident damaged his left leg and he had to have it amputated after another 3 months of trying to save it.

Bruce said that his family has been and still is, very important to him. "Dorothy has been a fantastic support to me. I wouldn't be here today without her love, care & support. My children were only young when my problems started but they have been fantastic to both of us" He thinks the hardest times have been dealing with all the medical issues, being in hospital for years and getting his rightful entitlements from ACC.

Visiting places like Vietnam & Russia during his time at sea as a young man were some of the greatest risks he has taken in his life. Notwithstanding this, Bruce has travelled all over the world in his time in the merchant navy and feels lucky to have experienced this.

In 2004, Bruce & Dorothy travelled overseas together for the first time to attend their daughter's wedding in Ireland. Since then, they have travelled back to Europe, UK, USA, Hong Kong, Singapore and Australia and he says he is an experienced "disabled" traveller. Bruce said he has seen a lot of amputees "begging" on the streets but they always look a bit "sheepish" when they spot him without any legs pushing himself along in his wheelchair!


FAVOURITE MUSIC: The Bee Gees, listening to brass & jazz.

# **Team May Have Found Cause of Phantom Limb Pain**

According to researchers, a "reorganization" of the wiring of the brain may be the underlying cause of phantom limb pain, which occurs in the vast majority of individuals who have had limbs amputated. They have also found a potential method of treating it using artificial intelligence techniques. The researchers, led by a group from Osaka University in Japan in collaboration with the University of Cambridge, used a brain-machine interface to train a group of ten individuals to control a robotic arm with their brains. They found that if a patient tried to control the prosthesis by associating the movement with their missing arm, it increased their pain, but training them to associate the movement of the prosthesis with the unaffected hand decreased their pain.

Their results, reported in the journal *Nature Communications*, demonstrate that in patients with chronic pain associated with amputation or nerve injury, there are "crossed wires" in the part of the brain associated with sensation and movement. By mending that disruption, the pain can be treated. The findings could also be applied to other forms of chronic pain, including pain due to arthritis. A popular theory of the



cause of phantom limb pain is faulty "wiring" of the sensorimotor cortex, the part of the brain that is responsible for processing sensory inputs and executing movements. In other words, there is a mismatch between a movement and the perception of that movement. In the study, Ben Seymour, PhD and his colleagues, led by Takufumi Yanagisawa, MD, PhD, from Osaka University, used a brain-machine interface to decode the neural activity of the mental action needed for a patient to move their "phantom" hand and then converted the decoded phantom hand movement into that of a robotic neuroprosthesis using artificial intelligence techniques. "We found that the better their affected side of the brain got at using the robotic arm, the worse their pain got," said Yanagisawa. "The movement part of the brain is working fine, but they are not getting sensory feedback—there's a discrepancy there." The researchers then altered their technique to train the "wrong" side of the brain. For example, a patient who was missing their left arm was trained to move the prosthetic arm by decoding movements associated with their right arm, or vice versa. When they were trained in this counterintuitive technique, the patients found that their pain significantly decreased. As they learn to control the arm in this way, it takes advantage of the plasticity—the ability of the brain to restructure and learn new things—of the sensorimotor cortex, showing a clear link between plasticity and pain. Although the results are promising, Seymour warns that the effects are temporary and require a large, expensive piece of medical equipment to be effective. However, he believes that a treatment based on their technique could be available within five to ten years. 





