# Amputee Coalition 2013 National Conference

To sum up this Conference only takes one word and that is WOW! From the time we arrived on Wednesday, and left Sunday, it was Amputees rule. Over 957 amputees from five different countrys, all in one place, was overwhelming at times but also inspiring. From the New Technology displays in the exhibit hall to the educational programs, to the Adaptive Sport and Recreation Exposition, to the First Clinics, there were many opportunities to learn and experience ways to live with Limb Loss.

The clinics ran each day from 8:30am to 5:30pm and were on a great many subjects. To name just a few--Current topics in Prosthetic and amputee research---Living with your level of limb loss--Limb transplantation --Advances in socket fit Technology-- The travelling amputee--Tackling everyday challenges with modern Technology--Gait analysis--Pain management--and many more for every level of amputation.

The exhibit hall was packed full of every kind of product imaginable and each was giving away samples and information. Walter Reed National Military Med. Center, (where researchers are seeking to identify genetic differences between amputees who have phantom pain and those who do not by comparing DNA). This entailed filling out a survey and giving blood which both Mark and I did.—Hanger Clinic—Mayo Clinic—O&P Edge-Ossur—Ottobock—and numerous other companys all offering help for everyday life.

Speaking with some of these folks, I had the opportunity to present our little talk, which I had prepared ( with the help of Mervyn Monk) to many of them and they were all very impressed with our Federation and have offered any help they can . Many of them took a copy of the talk back to their main offices and will show it to other members in order for them to see what we do here in NZ. I will list the websites to some of them and also we will be receiving a couple of magazines online for our members, free of charge. Ottobock was extremely helpful in this way and will continue to sponsor us with material, as will the Amputee Coalition.

All in all it was a memorable experience. We met some great people and heard many stories of how people are coping with their loss. A Dr. From New Orleans who works with veterans will remain a life long friend, as will a young female paramedic from New Jersey, who lost her leg in a job related accident and is trying to get back to work.









#### Person Of Interest

Kia Ora and greetings to you all in New Zealand, from the United States of America.

My name is Wallis Wiremu Toataua-Farraday, and I have been living and working in the United States as a prosthetist for the past 20 years. I had the pleasure of meeting Mark and Sue this summer at the Amputee Coalition of America's Convention, hosted in my home town, Orlando Florida. Orlando is a wonderful city, and is one of the world's most popular tourist destinations. It is where Walt Disney created his 2<sup>nd</sup> theme park, know today as Walt Disney World.

I have been offered the privilege to write a small bio on myself and my experiences as a prosthetist working overseas treating amputees.

My journey began after qualifying as a prosthetist from CIT in Wellington New Zealand in1983. Interestingly enough, my Dad had been through a program in Auckland back in 1955, which trained personnel for Orthotics, Prosthetics and surgical footwear. He was the first Maori to qualify in New Zealand at that time. Some 30 years later I was one of 2 Maori Clinicians to qualify under the new qualifying program.

After spending 2 years practicing at the Auckland Artificial limb centre, I was offered a promotion at the University of Toronto as a practicing prosthetist. It was a wonderful experience, as I was selected to participate in a CAD CAM study, making limbs by computer. Today CAD is widely used throughout the profession, in fact we employ a system that was designed and developed by a New Zealand based company, Aranz. I spent 8 wonderful years in Canada. I was an examiner for the Canadian Board for certification, while also creating the first Canadian Orthotic & Prosthetic review program for residents. One of the highlights in Canada was fitting a young boy with elephant man's disease. His right arm weighed as much as his entire body. His arm was amputated, and I fit him with a Myo electric prosthesis. It was a great experience and one I will never forget. I am also proud to say that I coordinated a number of student exchanges between New Zealand, Canada and the USA. This I felt was important, as I wanted to give back to my country-NZ- that had provided me with a wonderful opportunity and career.

In 1992, I was contacted by a gentleman from California, who had been following my career. He in fact had met me in New Zealand back in 1982 at the Auckland Artificial Limb centre. He was a director for a company known as Nova Care. He offered me a position to manage a clinic in San Francisco, CA. I accepted and within 2 years I was over seeing 25 clinics in the San Francisco Bay Area.

I can certainly attest to the fact that the USA, is a breeding ground for opportunity.

# Person Of Interest (cont'd)

One of my highlights in California was fitting the first bilateral upper extremity amputee in the US to be recertified as a pilot. His certification took place in a simulator using the arms I made for him, and he still flies to this day. Prior to the accident he was a fighter pilot in Vietnam and then American Airlines. He lost both arms racing, across the Salt Lake flats at over 200 miles an hour, when he crashed.

In 2009 and 2011 I was recognized and awarded the JE Hanger excellence award for contributing to 2 innovative clinical procedures. One was a post operative procedure entitled the Kiwi. This procedure was used to provide new amputees with a protective shell over their amputated limb post surgically, reducing trauma to the limb should the patient sustain a fall. It also incorporated a gel liner that provided light compression over the wound promoting total contact, while also enhancing wound healing. A number of top Physicians in the USA conducted a study in the Kiwi with favorable results. The other procedure I was responsible for creating was the lock- it socket, for Hip disarticulation. This procedure has now been incorporated into Hangers Comfort flex line up of sockets for amputees. It is known as the Hanger comfort flex hip. It is a total contact surface bearing procedure that allows hip and hemi pelvectomy amputees to conserve energy when walking, while also providing improved comfort. The best part is that you can diagnostically fit a patient in 4 hours.

In summary I am currently the Zone Vice President for Hanger Clinic, based out of Orlando Florida, and I oversee 18 states on the Eastern United States seaboard. I really enjoy my job as I get to help many people accomplish their dreams through the use of technology and exceptional customer service.

I will be forever great full to the New Zealand Artificial Limb Board for my initial training and support they gave me.

Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to write this small column.

#### Member's Profile

#### . Alan Dearden

I would first like to outline a few reasons why I became interested in promoting Amputee golf. I read an article about the physically disabled population having an increased risk of secondary diseases through the lack of physical exercise or sport above their everyday activity. As well as the reduced risk of secondary disease there are numerous social and psychological benefits of being involved in sport.

I was born with Bi-literal club feet. I had several operations during the 1950's and early 60's and spent many of these years in and out of hospital and wearing splints. I was and still am a very good swimmer, as I found that this was a sport I could compete in as walking and running was difficult. Then in my teenage years I discovered golf, and I soon became a good competitor at club level in this sport, even though I sometimes struggled to walk the 18 holes. I continued playing golf throughout my life until my right foot became so arthritic that even standing was difficult. It was at this time 9 years ago at the age of 53 that I decided to have my right foot amputated- the best decision of my life. My daughter even commented after my amputation that I had also had a personality transplant as well.( When you are living in pain all the time you don't realise how much it effects your moods).

It was soon after my amputation that I was at the Burwood limb centre and saw a notice for a Golf tournament for Amputees being organized at Waiheke Island. I played in this tournament with about 20 other amputees from other parts of NZ and Australia. It was great to see others with the same disability as myself getting on with life and playing sport and not complaining about their situation. The Tournament was held the following year again at Waiheke Island, and it was then decided to try and organize an annual tournament alternating between the South Is and the North.. So I organized it the following year at Cromwell, where I was living at the time. We have since had tournaments in Whangarei, Nelson, Auckland, Christchurch and Wellington. Next year is Dunedin and then back to Waiheke Island for our 10th anniversary in 2015. I have played in all the tournaments as well as a few of the Australian Amputee tournaments.

Four years ago we formed Amputee Golf NZ Inc. so that we could apply for some funding to help players with travel and costs of tournaments. I am the second President of the Association and have been now for past three years. Golf is a sport that can be played by people of all ages and abilities. It is great for co-ordination and balance, great exercise and with the golf handicapping system all players can compete on a level playing field, no matter what their disability. We have players on single figure handicaps (7) and players on high handicaps 36 plus, and it's often these one who are having more fun than the serious competitors. We cater for everyone. It doesn't matter even if you only play once a year. It's about giving it a go, having fun and a laugh. New members are welcome and if anyone wishes to have further information or to contact me that's fine. Kind regards and Merry Christmas.


